6. What was done to help an elderly king stay warm? Answer: Abishag the Shunamite was brought to King David to stand before him and serve him and to keep him warm in his old age, but he "knew her not." (One of my college Bible teachers described this as a "personal hot water bottle.") 1 Kings 1:1 Now king David was old and stricken in years; and they covered him with clothes, but he gat no heat. 2 Wherefore his servants said unto him, Let there be sought for my lord the king a young virgin: and let her stand before the king, and let her cherish him, and let her lie in thy bosom, that my lord the king may get heat. 3 So they sought for a fair damsel throughout all the coasts of Israel, and found Abishag a Shunammite, and brought her to the king. 4 And the damsel was very fair, and cherished the king, and ministered to him: but the king knew her not.

7. Who recognized characteristics of both his sons that were evident in the younger of the two? Answer: Isaac. Genesis 27:22. Jacob, in an effort to deceive his father had used goatskin to imitate the hair that covered his brother's body, putting it on his hands and neck. Isaac recognized the "hands of Esau and the voice of Jacob." Jacob was the twin born last, thus he was the "younger."



3.What is the connection between pleasure and poverty?

5.Introduction for the question: It was said of the prodigal son that while he was in the far country, "he came to himself". I assume from this statement that while he was satisfied to live in the "far country" he was "not himself" or was "beside himself". Question. Answers for week of February 19

1. Who asked that his killers not be charged with what they were doing wrong?

Answer: **Stephen and/or Jesus**. Because of the wording of the text, the word "charge" best fits the death of Stephen.

Acts 7:59 And they stoned Stephen, calling upon God, and saying, Lord Jesus, receive my spirit. 60 And he kneeled down, and cried with a loud voice, Lord, lay not this sin to their charge. And when he had said this, he fell asleep. (See also Luke 23:33.)

2. What king offered clothing, gold and political power to the one who could read and explain a "writing"?

Answer: The correct answer is Nebuchadnezzar's "son" Belshazzar. He made the offer to his wise men, and later to Daniel.

(Dan 5:1-8) Belshazzar the king made a great feast to a thousand of his lords, and drank wine before the thousand. {2} Belshazzar, whiles he tasted the wine, commanded to bring the golden and silver vessels which his father Nebuchadnezzar had taken out of the temple which was in Jerusalem; that the king, and his princes, his wives, and his concubines, might drink therein. {3} Then they brought the golden vessels that were taken out of the temple of the house of God which was at Jerusalem; and the king, and his princes, his wives, and his concubines, drank in them. {4} They drank wine, and praised the gods of gold, and of silver, of brass, of iron, of wood, and of stone. {5} In the same hour came forth fingers of a man's hand, and wrote over against the candlestick upon the plaster of the wall of the king's palace: and the king saw the part of the hand that wrote. {6} Then the king's countenance was changed, and his thoughts troubled him, so that the joints of his loins were loosed, and his knees smote one against another. {7} The king cried aloud to bring in the astrologers, the Chaldeans, and the soothsayers. And the king spake, and said to the wise men of Babylon, Whosoever shall read this writing, and show me the interpretation thereof, shall be clothed with scarlet, and have a chain of gold about his neck, and shall be the third ruler in the kingdom. {8} Then came in all the king's wise men: but they could not read the writing, nor make known to the king the interpretation thereof.

Then Daniel was brought to Belshazzar: (Dan 5:16-18) And I have heard of thee, that thou canst make interpretations, and dissolve doubts: now if thou canst read the writing, and make known to me the interpretation thereof, thou shalt be clothed with scarlet, and have a chain of gold about thy neck, and shalt be the third ruler in the kingdom. {17} Then Daniel answered and said before the king, Let thy gifts be to thyself, and give thy rewards to another; yet I will read the writing unto the king, and make known to him the interpretation. {18} O thou king, the most high God gave Nebuchadnezzar thy father a kingdom, and majesty, and glory, and honour:

3. Who asked God if he was responsible for his brother's welfare?

Answer: Cain. After his offering was rejected and his brother's accepted, an angry Cain rejected the message of God to him. Instead he killed his brother, Abel. God asked him where Abel was, and Abel said he did not know. He retorted, "Am I my brother's keeper?" These words have become synonymous with the attitude that we have no responsibility for the welfare of others, but God sees it otherwise.

(Gen 4:8-10) And Cain talked with Abel his brother: and it came to pass, when they were in the field, that Cain rose up against Abel his brother, and slew him. {9} And the LORD said unto Cain, Where is Abel thy brother? And he said, I know not: Am I my brother's keeper? {10} And he said, What hast thou done? the voice of thy brother's blood crieth unto me from the ground.

4. Who indicated that his teacher had not fully convinced him to follow Christ?

Answer: King Agrippa (Acts 26:27-29) King Agrippa, believest thou the prophets? I know that thou believest. {28} Then Agrippa said unto Paul, Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian. {29} And Paul said, I would to God, that not only thou, but also all that hear me this day, were both almost, and altogether such as I am, except these bonds. Some have said that Agrippa was being sarcastic, saying in effect, "Do you think you can really persuade me to be a Christian?" But I tend to believe that is not so. Paul indicated his confidence that Agrippa believed the prophets, and when Agrippa said he was "almost persuaded," Paul declared his wish that Agrippa and all the others who heard him were not just almost but fully persuaded to be what he, Paul, was. He did not wish imprisonment on them, but his wish that they might be "as he was" shows the confidence of Paul in his salvation, his right standing with God.

5. Who talked to Jesus about the eating habits of canines?

Answer: A woman of Canaan (a Greek from Syrophenicia) begged Jesus to heal her daughter. When Jesus seemed to imply she was not worthy to be healed because she was a "dog," she said that even the dogs eat the crumbs from under the master's table.

Matt 15:22-27- And, behold, a woman of Canaan came out of the same coasts, and cried unto him, saying, Have mercy on me, O Lord, thou Son of David; my daughter is grievously vexed with a devil. 23 But he answered her not a word. And his disciples came and besought him, saying, Send her away; for she crieth after us. 24 But he answered and said, I am not sent but unto the lost sheep of the house of Israel. 25 Then came she and worshipped him, saying, Lord, help me. 26 But he answered and said, It is not meet to take the children's bread, and to cast it to dogs. 27 And she said, Truth, Lord: yet the dogs eat of the crumbs which fall from their masters' table.

Mark 7:25-29 For a certain woman, whose young daughter had an unclean spirit, heard of him, and came and fell at his feet: 26 The woman was a Greek, a Syrophenician by nation; and she besought him that he would cast forth the devil out of her daughter. 27 But Jesus said unto her, Let the children first be filled: for it is not meet to take the children's bread, and to cast it unto the dogs. 28 And she answered and said unto him, Yes, Lord: yet the dogs under the table eat of the children's crumbs. 29 And he said unto her, For this saying, go thy way; the devil is gone out of thy daughter.
