Jailbreaking

I recently had this "process" mentioned to me. It has to do with using unauthorized circuit cards to move your phone service from one carrier to another, I think. But as I listen to those who are familiar with such tech adventures I am wondering what processes are right. I remember hearing about stealing cable and now it seems to be 'sharing' programs or operating systems among peers. We are cautioned about stealing or coveting things. You may hear, 'it's not a big deal,

it costs the company so little they won't miss your fee; at the price quoted, the company is stealing from me.' The reasoning goes on and on. How does this thinking start? How did we become so insulated from the righteousness of God that small transactions are not counted as wrong. If I don't pay for the coffee or drinks at work, have I stolen? It's only 50 cents. Did this grow to taking a few supplies from work to the house? Did the big embezzler start with a coke?

Do we steal time from God? That Sunday morning we needed just a few more minutes of sleep and got to worship service just a little late. Later, did those few minutes grow so long that we were too late to go Sunday morning but thought we would make it Sunday night? (Heb. 10:25) Did I forget my contribution this Sunday and think I would make it up next week, and next week doesn't come? (1 Co. 16:2) On Wednesday night did I need that time at home to relax to make it the rest of the week? That roaring Lion (1 Peter 5:8) may not

be here to eat in large gulps but may be taking tiny bites until I am ready for the kill.

Technology, work, appointments, all take a small bite of our being. Do we lose our souls to the world? Is the theft so small no one really thinks much of it? Mark 4:19 "And the cares of the world and the deceitfulness of riches and the lust of other things entering in, choke the word and it becometh unfruitful".
